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Director's pote

Liverpool, on the western shore of the UK, suffered badly from the recession of the 1970s and 1980s and though Cape May on the southern shore of New Jersey is known as a resort town, its workers in 2023 are suffering from fears of a recession today. Our play takes place in 1988 but the issues are as current as ever. Shirley Valentine is the maiden name of Shirley Bradshaw and the title refers to Shirley regaining her identity – an identity lost to pre-conceived roles of wife and mother. Gail Collins reminds us in "When Everything Changed" that only recently could women get credit cards in their own names and that employment notices were divided by gender.

Though brutally funny, this is a work about empowerment as much as it is about identity. We know exactly who her husband Joe Bradshaw is and by the end of the play there is hope that he too has broken out of stereotypical roles and will enjoy rediscovering the woman he married. By mounting this production in 2023 we look through a wider lens of telling the story of empowerment and identity with inclusion of the LGBTQ community as well as the Asian and Black and Hispanic and indigenous communities. Breaking preconceived notions of roles and status takes courage.

Shirley has enormous courage in our story. Like Nora in Ibsen's "A Doll's House", she literally walks out the door to start a new life. Unlike Ibsen, Willy Russell continues her journey to give us a glimpse of what the future may hold. Conventional society was scandalized by Ibsen. Audiences in 1988 were amused by Russell. We invite you to continue the laugh in 2023 and add a moment of self-reflection.

Casting Cady McClain in this role is an example of life imitating art. Cady is the epitome of a powerful woman and an artist who continues to win Emmy Awards while working as a writer, director, visual artist and Artistic Director in her own right.

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Director's Bio



Roy Steinberg (Director) has directed classical and contemporary plays as well as world premieres all over the United States. He directed Ann Jackson, Kim Hunter, and Alvin Epstein in *The Madwoman of Chaillot* at the Neighborhood Playhouse in New York. As a member of Circle Repertory Company, he developed and directed *The Marriage Fool* with Lynn Cohen and Farley Granger. His production of *Othello* played at the Intar Theatre on Theatre Row in New York and he directed Joan Copeland in a new play called Second Summer for the Colleagues Theatre Company.

He was the Artistic Director of Theatre Matrix in New York and the John Michael Kohler Arts Center in Wisconsin. He has directed touring companies of bilingual productions of *Moliere's The Miser* and *The Bourgeois Gentleman*. As a Guest Artist he has directed college students throughout our nation in plays like *American Buffalo*, *Our Town*, *The Importance of Being Earnest*, and *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Mr. Steinberg has also produced and directed film and television including *Guiding Light*, *One Life To Live*, *Days Of Our Lives*, *Forensic Files*, and *Scandalous Art*. He has four Emmy nominations for his work. He directed Jo Beth Williams in *Life In General* on strike.tv, which won five Spirit Awards.

At Cape May Stage, Mr. Steinberg has directed Souvenir, Moon Over Buffalo, Blithe Spirit, How to Make a Rope Swing, Say Goodnight Gracie, Social Security, Visiting Mr. Green, Proof, Class, Steel Magnolias, The Understudy, I Hate Hamlet, Boeing Boeing, Happy Days, Freud's Last Session, The Santaland Diaries, The Woolgatherer, Mistakes Were Made, This Wonderful Life, The Search for Signs of Intelligent Life in the Universe, Dead Man's Cell Phone, Disgraced, Buyer and Cellar, The Tale of the Allergist's Wife, The Gin Game, Outside Mullingar, The Ultimate Christmas Show, Chapter Two, The Shuck, An Actor's Carol, Heisenberg, Sylvia, Sidekicked, Last of the Red Hot Lovers, Double Play, America's Sexiest Couple, The Lifespan of a Fact, and One Christmas Carol. Mr. Steinberg has an MFA from the Yale School of Drama. He also functions as the Producing Artistic Director. His proudest production is his daughter, Alexa Catherine.

Cady McClain (Shirley Valentine) is a history making three-time Emmy© Award winning actress.

She is the first woman to have won three Emmys[©] for three different characters on three different television shows: All My Children (Best Juvenile, 1991), As the World Turns (Best Supporting, 2004), and Days of Our Lives (Best Guest Performer, 2021). She has performed Off-Broadway at 2nd Stage as "Lady" in David Ives' The Red Address with Kevin Anderson (directed by Pam Berlin), at Lincoln Center Theater as "Hero" in Much Ado About Nothing, as "Adriana" in A Comedy of Errors at Hudson Theater Guild (with Erik Jensen), as "Cory" in Barefoot in the Park

at the Westbury and Valley Forge Music Fair, and as "Tamra/Bridget" in Quiet on the Set at the Westbeth Theatre Center. Her film work includes My Favorite Year (with Peter O'Toole) and Pennies From Heaven (with Steve Martin and Bernadette Peters) and starring roles in the independent films Soldier's Heart (directed by Actor's Studio member Brian Delate), Home Movie (with Adrian Pasdar, released through IFC), Alma Mater (with Alexander Chaplin and Will Lyman), Simple Justice (with Doris Roberts and Cesar Romero), and Retreat (with Michael E. Knight). Television credits include several episodes of Law and Order SVU (with Mariska Hargitay, Amanda Seyfried, and Christopher Meloni in 2004, then Kevin Kane and Ice T in 2023), Cheers (with Woody Harrelson and Ted Danson), and St. Elsewhere (with Christina Pickles). Her feature directorial debut, Seeing is Believing: Women Direct (featuring Lesli Linka Glatter, Sarah Gavron, and Naima Ramos Chapman, among others) won Best Documentary Pro Action at the Artemis Women in Action Film Festival, the Audience Award at the SOHO Film Festival, a Jury Prize at the Newport Beach Film Festival, and Best Documentary at the Ridgewood Guild International Film Festival. The film is now distributed on PBS and the educational online platform, Kanopy. She was honored to be awarded the International Matrix Award for her work related to supporting the female voice in film and television by the Association of Women in Communications. An Ambassador for Kids in the Spotlight (a foster youth filmmaking program) she is also the Artistic Director for AxialTheatre in Westchester, NY. She teaches acting at Michael Howard Studios in NYC.

Willy Russell "Shirley Valentine"

The Playwright

Willy Russell was recently represented on Broadway with his smash-hit transfer from London, Blood Brothers. For Shirley Valentine Mr. Russell won the 1989 Tony Award, Drama Desk Award for Best Play and Oliver Award for Best Comedy of the Year. His worldwide hit play and movie Educating Rita won London's SWET Award for Best Comedy, and in 1981, an Academy Award nomination for screenplay adaptation.

Born in Liverpool, he left school at 15 to become a hairdresser before returning to education and becoming a teacher. It was while training to become a teacher that he wrote his first play, which premiered at the Edinburgh Festival, When the Reds. His adaptation of Alan Plater's Tigers are Coming O.K. was his first professional work, presented in Liverpool in 1973. This was followed by John Paul George Ringo... and Bert which moved from Liverpool to the West End, winning the Evening Standard and London Theatre Critics Awards for Best Musical. Mr. Russell was Commissioned to write a play for the Royal Shakespeare Company. The result, Educating Rita, ran on the West End for two years, has been performed all over the world and was made into a motion picture starring Michael Caine and Julie Walters. Blood Brothers opened in Liverpool in 1983, before subsequently moving to the West End.

In addition to the film Educating Rita he wrote screenplays for the movie versions of Shirley Valentine and Dancing Thru The Dark based on his plays Stags and Hens. His plays have been translated into almost every language, with productions currently running in Japan, Australia, South America, Scandinavia and Europe.



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

CAPE MAY STAGE

Our History



Cape May Stage has a rich history dating back to 1989, when it staged its first official production, "Sea Marks," at the Chalfonte Hotel and Cold Spring Village. In 1993, Cape May Stage moved into its permanent home at 405 Lafayette Street, where it still performs today. This beautifully restored and maintained historic building was erected in 1853 as the Cape Island Presbyterian Church (known as the "Visitor's Church"), and later served as a community center and welcome center for the town.





Over the years, many people have contributed to the success of Cape May Stage. But none more so than its founder, **Michael Laird**. By his own account, Michael was an "equity actor and a director and a producer and a sculptor and a playwright and a poet and a clown." Before settling in Cape May he appeared Off-Broadway in New York, at the Walnut Street Theatre in Philadelphia and at Asolo State Theatre in Sarasota, Fla. He also did summer stock at PEI Playhouse in Prince Edward Island, Canada. Michael ran Cape May Stage until he passed away in 2001.

The building used by Cape May Stage is called the Robert Shackleton Playhouse. Named after the late actor **Robert Shackleton**, whose family has deep roots in Cape May, the theater pays tribute to his acting career. Mr. Shackleton was raised in suburban Philadelphia, graduating from Temple University and then moving on to perform in Broadway and London theaters, as well as in the movies. His acting career was interrupted by World War II and in 1956 he tragically passed away at the age of 42. His love of theater lives on in Cape May as his daughter, Leslie Shackleton Martel, serves as the president of the Cape May Stage board of directors.

Thanks to the generosity of the Shackleton family along with other members of the Cape May Stage community, the building was renamed the Robert Shackleton Playhouse in 2007 and this historic structure is now a state-of-the-art theatre known to residents and visitors as "the jewel in the crown of Cape May's architectural gems".



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


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
